Our Milepost 1 team celebrated Pchum Ben with their classmates recently. We hope you all enjoy a peaceful and safe Pchum Ben.







The International Middle Years Curriculum (IMYC) is used in state, independent and international schools all over the world.

Students learning with the International Middle Years Curriculum focus on a combination of academic, personal and international learning designed specifically to engage and inspire them. The IMYC provides the opportunity for students to enjoy being challenged in their learning of a wide range of subjects. It helps them to develop an enquiring mind, the personal attributes that will support them throughout their later teenage and adult years, and a sense of their own nationality and culture, at the same time developing a profound respect for the nationalities and cultures of others. Through the IMYC approach to learning, students develop the knowledge, skills and understanding necessary to confidently face the world of the future.



The International Middle Years Curriculum uses abstract, conceptual themes to provide a focus for student learning. These conceptual themes, which each last for six weeks, stimulate students to think about their meaning and connection through their subject and personal learning. Each six week unit incorporates opportunities for regular journaling and blogging to encourage students to reflect on their learning. This helps them to develop their understanding of how the conceptual theme relates to them personally and to the world around them. To end the unit, each student presents their understanding in the form of a personal media project.



# Helping your Child with their Learning

### The ten things you can do with your child to help them develop an understanding of who they are and their place in the world

#### 1. Value similarities and differences

From their earliest years, help your child to be aware that we all share similarities as well as differences. People, just like plants and animals, all have the same basic needs of shelter, food and care but, like plants and animals, there are differences in people too; in their appearance, where they live, the food they eat, their interests and lifestyles, their beliefs and cultures. The differences are what make people so interesting. Find opportunities in everyday life to help your child to develop an understanding of this.

#### 2. Look for similarities before the differences

When talking with your child about others, value the differences but, importantly, emphasise the similarities. Sometimes just looking for similarities first, before talking about the differences, can change the way we think about people.

#### 3. Help your child develop a sense of their own identity

Look at your own family history. Talk about where all your family members were born and have lived. Talk about the celebrations you have and the traditions you follow and help your child to know why these are important to your family. Talk about other things that make your family unique.

#### 4. Help your child to develop a sense of others

Help your child to see things from the point of view of other people. Talk about the celebrations and traditions of your friends and neighbours. Everyone does things in different ways and for different reasons. Help your child to understand that different doesn't mean wrong.

There is a quote from Harper Lee's book *To Kill A Mockingbird* that might help you: "You never really understand a person until you consider things from his point of view... until you climb into his skin and walk around in it." Encourage your child to put themselves into 'other people's shoes and have a good walk around'. They could think about other children or people in their school or in their community or in other places in the world. What does your child and your family have in common with these children or people?

#### 5. Get a world map and display it where you can all see it

The kitchen is a great location, or somewhere that your whole family gathers together. Then every time you talk about a different place in the world, you can take a look at the map to find out where it is. Ask your child to find the country it is located in and perhaps identify who has visited or lived there and what makes the place similar and different to your own.

#### 6. Explore the food you eat

Think about the food you eat each day and try to find out where the ingredients come from to make your meal. For example, if you are making pizza, ask yourselves: where does the cheese come from, and the tomatoes, and the flour for the dough? What about the olives? Alternatively, you could look in your fridge or store cupboard and look at the labels to see where the food you have bought comes from.

Talk about how we depend on so many different countries for the food that we enjoy. You could even eat your way around the world, exploring a food, dish or recipe from a different country each week.

#### 7. Find out where things are made

Help your child to look at the labels of their clothes, their toys and the everyday things around you to find out where they were made. Talk about how these items have found their way from the country they were made in to your local store – this can lead to some really interesting discussions about trade and transport. You could use your world map to locate these different places.

#### 8. Enjoy music and stories from other countries

Collect stories from around the world. This can include traditional folk and fairytales from other countries, and stories about other countries too. You could read your way around the world. You can do the same with music too.

#### 9. Find out what's happening around the world

Encourage your child to follow news around the world on a child-friendly news website or news source such as CBBC or First News, or you may find this page of the Newseum website helpful: www.newseum.org/todaysfrontpages/Choose a global news story and talk about this with your family. Think about the impact of this news story on the children and adults of that country, and of your own country too.

#### 10. Talk about the roles people play and the jobs people do

Talk about the people that your child comes across in everyday life – the cook, the office manager, the teacher and the caretaker at school. Help your child to realise that each one of these people has an important part to play in making the school function well. Think about all the people in your local community and talk about how important it is to have someone who runs the shop, who helps people when they are ill, who collects the rubbish, and who teaches children. Help your child to value the work that everyone does.

All of these activities will help your child to start developing a sense of themselves and of others. This is essential for the development of international mindedness; a vital part of learning and a fundamental part of the International Primary Curriculum. # Milepost 1 You choose!







We started off the year in Milepost 1 with a mini-topic called 'You Choose!'. We got to explore how we learned best, the type of activities we enjoyed doing most and even the crazy things we liked to dress up as! A great start to the year!























MUSIC. We heard two pieces of music inspired by insects and we listened for the pitch and the tempo. Then each class chose a piece and choreographed a dance to mimic the insect represented by the music.

### **MP1 Flowers & Insects**



For our entry point, Milepost 1 had an amazing UGLY BUG BALL! We all chose an insect to dress up as and then designed and made a costume, including a mask, antennae and even wings. We also created some amazing decorations for the hall which looked incredible! Then we had a brilliant time parading, playing games, and dancing like fantastic ugly bugs!









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# Years 1 & 2 Milepost 1

In **SCIENCE** we have found out lots of amazing things.

We started off by thinking about things that are alive, were alive and that have never been alive. We looked at pictures of lots of different things and had to decide which category they were in.

Then we looked at some seeds. We had to predict what fruits they came from and then check if we were correct. After that we drew pictures showing what we had seen.

Next we investigated what would happen if we put flowers into coloured water. Amazingly, our beautiful white roses turned colourful!!! It was incredible.

After all of that we moved on to learning about insects. We found out about what special features insects have and tried to label them. We also studied the lifecycle of a butterfly and tried to put each part in the right order.







For **GEOGRAPHY** we learned all about insect habitats.

That means that we found out where ladybirds, grasshoppers, butterflies, bees and lots of other insects like to live. We also learned about using a key to make a useful map. This helped us make a map of some insect habitats we created in class.



In ART we began by learning about the work of some famous painters who had painted flowers. We then worked with Ms. Laura and tried to learn some of the skills they had used when they created their original works. After that, each class had a go at reproducing one of the famous paintings. We were really proud of the









During our music sessions with Ms. Julie we investigated how sounds were created. We then worked in our teams to design and make our own musical instruments by recycling empty containers, tubes and boxes. Once our instruments were ready we composed a piece of recycled music and gave a performance.

### **Milepost 2 Active Planet**



MP2 are currently investigating our Active Planet. During the entry point, the school hall was turned into an earthquake evacuation centre! Year 3 and 4 had to make sure that injured people were bandaged up, that people were reunited with their families, and that everybody had something to eat and drink.





When learning about Earthquakes, Milepost 2 built make shift houses on the edge of tables to represent the edge of the techtonic plates. We then simulated earthquakes and made videos of what happened to the houses. We measured the strength of our Earthquakes on our own homemade seismographs.

### **Year 3 Music**









Year 3 have been learning to follow notation during their music sessions with Ms. Julie.

The children worked together to perform pieces of music.

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### Milepost 3 Time Tunnel



MP3 had great fun journeying through time for 'The Time Tunnel' entry point. The children worked in mixed class groups and had to move through a range of challenges from different periods in history, these included spy codes from World War 2, the first Olympic Games, pyramids in Egypt and many more!


It was a great start to our first topic of the year!











Milepost 3 showed remarkable team work during their Art project in our Time Tunnel topic. We took 16 sections of the Bayeux tapestry which tells the story of events that lead to the conquering of England by the Normans. Each home-base team took a different section of the tapestry and tried their best to recreate the original tapestry as accurately as possible. This was not easy as the original tapestry is incredibly detailed and impressive! We are hoping to have the finished work on display as soon as possible. We were focusing on using a range of materials in our work.





### Milepost 3 Time Tunnel







I feel extremely lucky at eighteen to be doing what I am doing with regards my music. I am signed to a record label and travelling the world playing and working with first class musicians. I feel I need to give something back for this privileged life so I made a decision to use my visit to Cambodia to raise money for poor children in Phnom Penh via a local charity called CamKids. The funds raised will help buy musical instruments for the Youth School.

I will be travelling out to Cambodia with my bass player Aidan. As well as giving workshops and performing at iCAN International, we will be visiting and working with pupils at a local school for underprivileged children in Phnom Penh called Youth School, which is set along the railway tracks in the 'slum' district of the city. The Youth School is a Community Centre and School bringing education and health projects to children and young people using a variety of programmes and activities. Run by Empowering Youth in Cambodia (EYC) and funded by CamKids, this small school is showing some very effective ways to give young people a 'hand up' and have fun along the way. Youth School has over 100 children attending daily and is primarily an after-school programme since Government Schools teach only four hours each day. During the morning and afternoon sessions, students are primary school age, while in the evening they are high school age as well as youths who have dropped out of school and are unemployed and living on the streets.

iCAN will be our host while Aidan and I are in Cambodia and will be supporting our fundraising activities by holding various fundraising events themselves. We will also be performing an acoustic set in public venues in Phnom Penh of which all proceeds will go towards the 'Youth School' campaign.

I hope this visit to Cambodia is seen as the beginning of what hopefully will be a three to four year fundraising project.


Tobi performed for our whole school, as well as leading music workshops with our KS3 learners.

### Birthdays at iCAN



If you would like your child to celebrate their birthday with their friends at school please follow these simple guidelines so that the children do not have their learning disrupted.

Ask your child's teacher at least one day in advance.

Bring in cupcakes ONLY \* before 1pm on their birthday.

\*No large cakes, other foods items, drinks or gifts should be brought into school. If these are brought into school they will be returned uneaten or opened.

The cupcakes will be given to the children at the end of the school day after a birthday song.





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### **Family-School Communication**

We are really committed to developing more effective channels of communication with members of our community. **Improving communication between home and school is a priority for us.** 

There are a number of communication systems in school both formal and informal

There is written communication which is usually e-mailed home, unless a consent form needs to be completed, in which case a paper copy also goes home;

- incidental letters.
- **fortnightly newletters** published by each year group which are posted on the school website every second Friday. These newsletters contain information about the learning that is taking place in each year group and across mileposts and other information on events that are planned.
- the **iCAN Times** which is posted on the school website at the end of each learning block which is always packed with photos and information relating to that learning block.
- Our **iCAN** website and our online school calendar which is updated with the latest school events. This online Google calendar can also be downloaded to your computer, tablet or smartphone, where reminders can be set up so that you don't miss any of the upcoming school events.
- Our **family notice board** in our school canteen. Upcoming events and notices are posted on this board for all families to access.
- The 'reading records' that go home each day in your child's reading folder are another means of communication with your child's class teacher about your child's reading.

At iCAN PLAY there are 'Home—School books' which families and teachers use to write messages about individual children in.

#### There is also verbal communication

If you have a question or concern please do come and talk to one of us at school. Generally, if your question or concern is related directly to your child e.g. progress, health or behaviour then your first port of call is your child's class teacher. Class teachers are usually happy to have a quick chat in class at **7.20am** but if you need longer then please make an appointment to meet with them.

Parent/Carer drop in sessions You are also invited to visit your child's class on the second Monday of learning blocks 2, 4 and 5 for an hour after school, so that your child can share their learning with you. This also offers you the opportunity to talk with your child's teacher about their learning.

If you need further clarification or your question is related to a wider school issue please make an appointment to see either Ms. Lily, Head of Early Years, Mr. David, Vice Principal, Ms. Lori, Principal or Ms. Margaret Head of KS3.

If the matter is related to general day to day administration such as the payment of fees please speak to Ms. Raksmey, Ms. Roseta or Mr. Sophak

If you have ideas or suggestions on how we can improve our channels of communication please do let us know.


# **Team building Climbing**
